Learning Buddies: Spell your child's first name, using the lines to write large letters. Use an uppercase letter for the first letter in the name and lowercase letters to spell the rest. Have your child trace the letters with a finger crayon or pencil.

Learning Buddies: Trace and say the Trace and say the number. Read the count to find the answers.

Read the entire sentence to your child while pointing out that reading is done from left to right. Older children may want to trace all or some of the lters in the sentence

Write the letters $\mathbf{O}$ and $\mathbf{X}$ on a piece of paper. Cut the letters $\mathbf{F}$ and $\mathbf{B}$ out of the newspaper. Show your child how the letters can be put in front of the $\mathbf{O}$ and $\mathbf{X}$ to make the words fox and box.
