Shumway's move to QB boosts San Juan

Cameron Shumway wasn't afraid to admit it.

There were times that he felt overlooked. Under-appreciated. Under the radar, if you will.

Of course, there were reasons for that. Class 2A was nothing this season if not a launching ground for individual players with ridiculous statistics. But Shumway had the stats. And he had the wins as well.

"That made me feel better," Shumway said. "I knew that I was playing on a great team, and I knew that we wanted to win another title. That was our first priority. If we accomplished that, then I knew that the recognition would come."

Shumway is the Class 2A MVP for *The Tribune* because of his leadership, and his ability to make plays when games were on the line. And, of course, for his statistics.

Shumway, a smooth, agile, 6-foot-5 senior quarterback,

didn't have many games where he needed to be on the field in the fourth quarter.

San Juan was, in a word, dominant this season, winning every game by at least 12 points and turning many contests into flat blowouts.

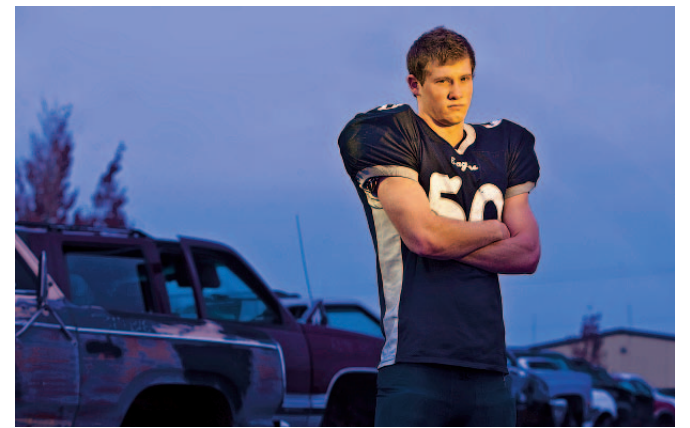
But he was the best player in the state in a class full of great ones. For the season, Shumway tossed 21 touchdown passes, six interceptions, and he threw for over 2,100 yards.

Most importantly, Shumway's team virtually was unbeatable when he started games. And to think, he played his first two seasons as a safety.

As a quarterback, Shumway's led San Juan to a double dose of titles, yet he has the same easy smile and shy personality that's endeared him to his teammates and coaches alike.

"I've really loved my teammates and I've loved the last two years," Shumway said. "We all knew what we were capable of, we all knew that we wanted to win it again. It's been a lot of fun."

Duchesne ran to 1A title behind work of Maret

Grant Maret isn't going to say many words.

He's not going to lead a team with a rousing speech. And he by no means is a chatter box. So when he speaks, people would be wise to listen.

"Why are offensive linemen so important?" Maret shot back when asked. "Because without us, running backs wouldn't get anywhere."

With that, let's take a look at Duchesne and the way the Eagles ran the ball this season. Braiden Despain, one of the best players in Class 1A, rushed for over 1,400 yards and 16 touchdowns. He averaged almost 11 yards per carry.

Jerry Ginn ran for seven touchdowns. Devin Fabrizio ran for six scores. Shiana Allen? Another five touchdowns.

All of those statistics largely came because Maret was a rock in the middle of the offensive line at center. And because of that, Maret is *The*

Tribune's Class 1A MVP.

"I thought it was a team effort for us," Maret said. "We worked hard as offensive linemen, and we had a really good group of guys running the ball. We needed each other."

Maret's as soft-spoken as he is strong in the trenches. But he's as mean as they come from play to play. Time and again he opened holes the size of trucks for his running backs to scoot through. Time and again he penetrated the line of scrimmage and blew plays up in the backfield from his nose tackle position.

Time and again, he made plays that will never show up in the stat sheet. Time and again he showed that statistics didn't matter.

Duchesne won a state title this season, and Maret was at the forefront of that effort. In the process, he proved that quarterbacks, running backs and wide receivers can be flashy and they can put up gaudy statistics.

But it means nothing without some in there doing the grunt work.
